- 2. How to create a technical report to document an engineering project
- 3. How to obtain the DC-motor and tacho-generator characteristics
- 4. How to analyze control systems with feedback and the influence of gain on the system stability
- 5. How to introduce velocity feedback into a closed-loop position controller and its effects How a simple system follows a ramp with an error, and the effect of the gain on the system response 6. How information is modulated and demodulated using amplitude modulation.
